

Move-In Day Packing List For Parents

A practical parent-focused checklist for packing the car, managing move-in day, helping without overdoing it, and leaving your student set up for the first night.

What this PDF includes: parent day-of bag, documents, car/unloading supplies, setup tools, cleaning basics, food and water, first-night items, roommate reminders, housing-rule checks, and a notes page.

Student	School / Dorm	Move-in date / time

Quick Start

- ☐ Confirm the move-in time slot, parking, check-in location, and unloading rules.
- ☐ Print or save move-in instructions, dorm address, and emergency contacts.
- ☐ Pack the first-night bag separately so it does not get buried.
- ☐ Label bins by room zone: bedding, bathroom, desk, clothes, cleaning, tech.
- ☐ Ask the roommate before buying shared items like rugs, fridge, microwave, or TV.
- ☐ Check school rules before packing appliances, bed risers, cords, candles, or tools.
- ☐ Bring water, snacks, chargers, basic tools, trash bags, wipes, and patience.
- ☐ Plan one last store run after seeing the room instead of buying everything early.

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Plan what to buy, what to skip, and how to make dorm life easier.

Parent Command Center

Keep these items easy to reach. Do not pack them under bins or bedding.

☐ Phone charger and portable power bank	☐ Parking pass, unloading pass, or time-slot confirmation
☐ Printed or saved move-in instructions	☐ Campus map or screenshot of the unloading route
☐ Dorm address and building name	☐ Emergency contact list
☐ Student ID or check-in QR code if provided	☐ Health insurance card or copy
☐ Photo ID for parent/guardian if required	☐ Any required housing forms or keys/check-in paperwork

Parent tip: Screenshot everything before you leave. Campus Wi-Fi and cell service can be unreliable on move-in day.

Car Packing Plan

Pack zone	What goes there	Why it helps
Front seat / parent bag	Documents, chargers, snacks, water, parking pass	Easy access during check-in
Top layer	First-night bag, bedding, cleaning wipes, tools	Needed before the room is fully unpacked
Middle	Clothes bins, storage bins, desk items	Unpack after the room is wiped down
Back / trunk bottom	Decor, extra supplies, non-urgent items	Can wait until the basics are set

Label Before You Leave

☐ Student name and phone number on bins	☐ Fragile labels for lamps, mirrors, or tech
☐ Dorm building and room number on labels	☐ First-night label on the bag that must come out first

Unloading and Setup Supplies

These are the items parents usually wish they had packed when the room is crowded, hot, or chaotic.

☐ Small tool kit or screwdriver	☐ Microfiber cloth
☐ Scissors or box cutter used carefully	☐ Hand sanitizer or hand wipes
☐ Tape measure	☐ Small step stool if allowed and safe
☐ Painter tape or labels	☐ Doorstop only if allowed by housing
☐ Permanent marker	☐ Zip ties or cord ties
☐ Trash bags	☐ Command strips/hooks only if allowed
☐ Paper towels	☐ Collapsible wagon or cart if useful
☐ Disinfecting wipes or multi-surface spray	☐ Reusable tote for last-minute errands

Check your school rules: Some dorms restrict carts, bed risers, wall adhesives, tools, extension cords, and doorstops. When unsure, wait or ask housing.

Room Setup Order

Step	Do this first	Why
1	Wipe surfaces and check the room condition	You want photos before unpacking
2	Set the bed and first-night essentials	Your student can sleep even if everything else is messy
3	Place large storage pieces before filling them	Avoid moving heavy bins twice
4	Set up desk, chargers, and lamp	Classes and orientation start fast
5	Unpack clothes, bathroom, and cleaning items	Finish the functional zones before decor

Parent Day-of Bag

Pack this like a small survival kit. Move-in day is usually hot, crowded, and full of lines.

☐ Reusable water bottles	☐ Hand wipes or sanitizer
☐ Electrolytes or sports drinks	☐ Basic medicine your family normally uses
☐ Easy snacks that will not melt	☐ Small first-aid items
☐ Lunch plan or campus food plan	☐ Fan or cooling towel if it is hot
☐ Phone chargers and power bank	☐ Cash/card for parking, vending, or last-minute errands
☐ Comfortable shoes	☐ Tissues - move-in can be emotional

Do not bury this bag: Keep food, water, documents, chargers, and the first-night bag accessible until the room is mostly set up.

Student First-Night Bag

☐ Sheet set and pillowcase	☐ Phone charger and laptop charger
☐ Pillow and blanket/comforter	☐ Wallet, student ID, keys, and room key/card
☐ Pajamas and next-day outfit	☐ Water bottle and a few snacks
☐ Towel, shower shoes, and shower caddy	☐ Trash bag and wipes for quick cleanup
☐ Toothbrush, toothpaste, deodorant, skincare	☐ Glasses/contacts if needed
☐ Prescription medication and daily essentials	☐ Small comfort item from home if wanted

Buy Before Move-In vs. Wait

The best parent move-in strategy is not buying everything. Buy the basics, then wait until you see the room.

Category	Buy before move-in	Wait until room is seen
Bedding	Twin XL sheets, pillow, mattress protector, comforter	Extra blankets or decorative pillows
Bathroom	Shower shoes, towel, shower caddy, basic toiletries	Extra organizers or bulky bathroom storage
Storage	Hamper, a few bins, hangers	Large drawers, extra shelves, big under-bed systems
Cleaning	Wipes, trash bags, cloths, detergent	Bulky mop or vacuum until floor/storage is known
Decor	A few personal items	Large rugs, curtains, wall shelves, extra furniture
Appliances	Only what school allows	Anything roommate may also bring

Ask Roommate First

☐ Mini fridge	☐ Cleaning supplies
☐ Microwave	☐ Shared dishes or utensils
☐ Rug	☐ Fan or air purifier
☐ TV or gaming setup	☐ Storage between beds
☐ Curtains or shared decor	☐ Coffee maker or kettle if allowed

Parent reminder: If two families buy the same shared item, the room gets crowded before students even unpack.

What to Check With Housing

Rules vary by school and building. Check the official housing page or move-in packet before packing questionable items.

☐ Allowed appliances and wattage limits	☐ Candle, wax warmer, and incense bans
☐ Mini fridge size rules	☐ Curtain, rug, and furniture rules
☐ Microwave rules or microfridge rental options	☐ Cart, dolly, and elevator instructions
☐ Power strip and extension cord rules	☐ Parking/unloading time limits
☐ Bed lofting and bed riser rules	☐ Guest or family helper limits
☐ Wall adhesive, hooks, and tape rules	☐ Trash/recycling and cardboard disposal rules

Parent Reminders for a Smoother Goodbye

☐ Ask before rearranging the room or unpacking personal items.	☐ Make a simple plan for the first call/text after move-in.
☐ Let the student decide where daily items should go.	☐ Do not pressure the room to look perfect on day one.
☐ Take empty boxes and extra packaging home if possible.	☐ Leave basic supplies, not a whole storage closet.
☐ Do one last check for ID, keys, wallet, chargers, and medication.	☐ Make the goodbye kind, calm, and not too long.

Realistic goal: The room does not need to be finished on move-in day. It only needs to be safe, functional, and ready for the first night.

Move-In Day Timeline

Time / stage	Parent focus	Student focus
Before leaving	Load first-night bag last; confirm documents	Wear comfy clothes; keep ID and phone ready
Arrival	Follow parking/unloading rules	Check in and get key/card
Unloading	Move bins quickly; avoid blocking halls	Direct where items should go
Setup	Help with bed, cleaning, heavy items	Choose layout and organize daily items
Last errands	Buy only what the room actually needs	Text roommate before shared purchases
Before leaving	Remove boxes; check essentials	Confirm first-night bag, chargers, keys, meds
